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### A SPORTING CHANCE FOR THE BOP

Every Saturday morning thousands of Bay youngsters eagerly leap out of bed and pull on their sports uniforms.

They head to netball courts, hockey grounds, rugby fields, football fields and every other indoor or outdoor sports facility you can imagine.

Their enthusiasm and the sheer numbers now playing sport across our region - is in large part due to the success of the BayTrust *CoachForce* programme.

BayTrust *CoachForce* is designed to help recruit, train and retain coaches across a number of different sporting codes. The belief is the more coaches there are, the more opportunities exist for people to participate in sport at a grassroots level. And that's good for the community!

### **Providing Sport Options**

Sport BoP *CoachForce* leader, Dave Clarke, says 18 sporting codes now benefit from the programme locally. "All the research says that coaching is the

biggest sustainer in sport. *CoachForce* has been an incredibly important part of the Bay of Plenty sporting landscape and our coaches are second to none," Dave says.

"CoachForce has a huge impact on the ability of the region's sports organisations to deliver their sport," Dave says. "There are huge social benefits, plus it helps increase the overall participation in different sports."

BayTrust is the key founding funder of *CoachForce* which was developed by Sport Bay of Plenty in 1997. By 2016, BayTrust will have devoted a total of \$8.5 million to the initiative – the biggest commitment the organisation has made to any one project.

"A rallying cry that took our attention when we first got involved was, "Kids in sport don't end up in court". "We're extremely pleased with the success of CoachForce to date".

## FAMILY VIOLENCE - IT'S OK TO ASK FOR HELP

After Gloria Eves donated a book about family violence called "It's Time We Started Telling These Stories" to the Tongariro/Rangipo Prison, she received a letter in the mail.

"It was from a prisoner who had read the book in the prison library and saw himself and the way he had grown up. He wanted to become a better partner and a better father and he asked if I could help him."

Breakthroughs such as these are what Gloria strives for in her role as the Taupo Violence Intervention Network's Co-Ordinator.

### **Getting Noticed**

Powerful billboard messages erected by Taupo Violence Intervention Network, such as "Can't remember last night? Your kids will" and "Kids are safer when you're sober" have generated a lot of discussion. One is now painted on a mobility taxi and can be seen driving around Taupo each day.

"I think awareness has greatly increased. I always set up a stall at community events to hand out resources. When I first started in 2008, people would smile at me and walk past. Now they come up to me and have a lot of questions about how to support their family and friends."

#### **Zero Tolerance Needed**

The Taupo Violence Intervention Network's aim is to ensure all community services are working effectively together to raise awareness and promote zero tolerance towards violence.

BayTrust donated \$15,000 towards the Taupo Violence Intervention Network's operating costs this year.

# HELICOPTER ALWAYS AT THE READY - TO SAVE LIVES

"You can't believe the relief when I heard the BayTrust chopper! That gave me real hope for the first time."

Senior Pilot Barry Vincent and his crew are used to hearing comments like that.

When you're stranded in remote bush, or at sea, or struggling to cope with a serious injury, the arrival of the *BayTrust Rescue Helicopter* brings unimaginable relief.

The helicopter attends over 100 remote accident scenes around the central North Island each year, and also transfers critically ill patients between hospitals.

### **Coping With The Unexpected**

Barry says most people never dream they might one day need to be airlifted to safety.

"On any normal day people are out having fun or going about their business when 'bang' – their life-changes forever!"

The rescue machine is operated by Taupo-based Philips Search and Rescue Trust (PSRT), a charity providing free air health and rescue services to much of the North Island with six rescue helicopters and two fixed-wing planes.

The PSRT was founded in 1985 after an endowment by Philips New Zealand Limited to mark a light aircraft accident near Turangi in which two Philips personnel lost their lives.

PSRT Secretary David Wickham says it costs up to \$1 million a year to keep the rescue helicopter flying, with pilots, crew and medical staff – and the machine itself - all on standby 24/7.

"The government contributes about half and we have to raise the rest through donations, bequests and grants such as BayTrust's" David explains. "It's beyond question BayTrust's contribution saves, week by week, month by month - without the BayTrust it would be virtually impossible for this machine to operate."

BayTrust has been the helicopter's naming rights sponsor for the past 7 years, contributing \$200,000 annually.



### **INSPIRING OUR FUTURE INNOVATORS**

### - TO DREAM BIG

Aquinas College student Sam Boggiss now knows exactly what it takes to launch an innovative new product into a competitive marketplace.

Thanks to Priority One's Instep programme, the 16 year-old spent two weeks working alongside professional R&D and marketing experts to refine business ideas he had won Young Innovator Awards (YIA) in 2011 & 2012.

#### **Learning from Local Expertise**

Sam says his YIA experience has challenged, motivated and inspired him. "The team at Locus asked all the hard questions and challenged my thinking about the whole process," Sam explains. "It was really valuable to see how the professionals do it."

"At Woods we worked on branding and brand identity – we thought through every aspect of the user interface from the design, to the name and icon on the app. I was given a good overview of everything that's required when inventing a new product."

#### **Instep Provides Vital Link**

Instep manager Lyn Parlane says the YIA are just one example of the initiatives being undertaken by Priority One with the assistance of a \$10,000 grant from BayTrust.

"For our economy to grow, local industry requires a workforce that is motivated, innovative and has the right attitude and skills," she says.

To achieve this vision, Instep harnesses the energy and expertise of local businesses to inspire students to make informed career choices.

"Through this engagement school communities understand future skill needs relevant to the region's economic growth and prosperity and, local businesses are confident secondary schools are preparing students with the skills they need now and in the future," Lyn says.

"The programme could not achieve this critical level of engagement between business and secondary schools without BayTrust's support."

### LAKESIDE CONCERT IGNITES COMMUNITY SPIRIT

Nothing brings more joy to the organisers of Rotorua's annual Lakeside Concert than seeing a grandmother dancing alongside her mokopuna.

"When we see that, we know we've done our job," says Ian Edward, chairman of the Rotorua Lakeside Concert Charitable Trust.

"The whole purpose of Lakeside is to give people a sense of togetherness and pride in their city, and to have a great time!"

Lakeside is now in its 17th year and is the brainchild of lan, who has a passion for music and fondly recalls attending Christmas concerts at Rotorua's soundshell in the 1950s. Now an estimated 30,000 people converge on the Village Green beside Rotorua's lakefront every year to be entertained in a safe, fun, family-friendly setting.

### **Huge Undertaking**

"In any given year we have between 500 and 800 people involved in putting the whole event together – that's everything from the police, to the traffic wardens through to the cast, sound, lighting and stage crew."

This year's concert, held on the 9 March, featured an all-star cast plus a New Zealand Symphony

Orchestra trombone group, a Cirque de Solistyle act and a kapa haka troupe and magnificent fireworks finale. BayTrust contributed \$7,000, its 15th year of support and bringing its total contribution to \$180,000.

### NEIGHBOURHOODS DOING IT FOR THEMSELVES IN KAWERAU

Annie Kubler has lived on Kawerau's Robinson St for over 20 years and has recently watched her local neighbourhood come together like never before.

A new sense of community pride has emerged from an innovative project called "Neighbourhoods of Healthy Homes" which began in a small area of Kawerau in August 2012.

This three year programme aims to build strong relationships within the community and help residents to improve their homes and neighbourhoods through healthier, better insulated and maintained homes.

### Taniwha Keeps Watchful Eye

One spinoff of the programme has been the transformation of a local alleyway on Robinson Street in Kawerau.

Annie says the alleyway near her home (that connects Robinson St to Kawerau's town centre) felt very unsafe. "I certainly didn't like walking through there after 5pm."

So local residents pitched in and spent weeks tidying up the area and painting a brightly-coloured

mural of two magnificent fiery taniwha that run the length of the alleyway.

"It looks fantastic. It really represents Kawerau because it features our mountain and rivers. The neighbourhood has really taken possession of it."

Do-It-Yourself Delivers Fast Results

Project manager Mary Hermanson says the initiative has also seen local homeowners brush up their skills to solve home maintenance problems when a team from Bunnings held two DIY workshops. "Workshop attendees also received a start-up kit of products to get them going on their own maintenance tasks," Mary says.

The three year "Neighbourhoods Of Healthy Homes" project has received funding of \$400,000 from BayTrust, as well as funding from the Kawerau District Council and the Eastern Bay Energy Trust.

### **DILLON SCHOLARSHIPS**

The Dillon Scholarship is named after the late Ray Dillon, former Chairman of the Trust Bank Bay of Plenty Board, who died in tragic circumstances in 1989.

The Scholarship was established in 1990 to provide financial assistance to tertiary students who have disabilities, recognising the additional financial burdens such students often face.

In the 2013 year the Trust paid \$99,300 to 53 students. This brings the total of Dillon Scholarships granted to date to \$1.36m.

Students come from all over our region and here are just a few of their stories.

### **CONNOR FLEMING** (Tauranga)

A first year student, Connor Fleming started his Certificate in Radio Broadcasting Level 4 with a grant of \$2,000. A Radio Announcer at Z100 Tauranga and Youth FM Tauranga. He is working on assessments in sales, promotions and marketing, and events management – it is very busy and loving it.

Connor's tutor, Adrian, says: "Connor is going really well. He participates well in class. He has been excellent at putting new music in to the radio station. Always on time and turns up for class and does his radio shows. He also puts up posts on our Facebook page and monitors our website."



### KYLE BURLING (Rotorua)

Kyle began his first year of study with a Certificate in Creative
Arts Level 4 then in Semester 2 will continue with a Diploma in
Art and Design Level 5 at Waiariki Institute
of Technology.

Kyle's family acknowledged that his scholarship of \$2,000 is used towards full-time support of a specialist teacher in the classroom to clarify and explain the concepts of all the courses. Kyle has a natural talent and passion for practical art and has provided a beautiful painting depicting Kyle's life and the influences around him.

Kyle has entered a piece of art in the IHC art awards in July and The Rotorua Museum Art Awards in August.

### CHAIR AND TRUST MANAGER REPORT

for the Year Ended 31 March 2013

What a great time to be in the Bay of Plenty! We are delighted to be able to report on an exceptionally positive 12 months for your Community Trust.

In the 12 months to 31 March 2013 BayTrust approved a total of \$2.546m in grants (2012 \$2.285m) to 118 community organisations including \$95,595 in Dillon Scholarships (2012 \$143,000) to 53 tertiary students with disabilities.

BayTrust's Investments returned \$17.641m (12%) (2012 \$6.846m, 4.8%) over the year, one of the Trust's best ever yields and this has enabled it to not only grant the \$2.5m referred to above but to maintain its reserving for the effects of inflation and also to add significantly to its Grants Maintenance Reserve (GMR) – the buffer which allows grants to continue even in negative income years. The Trust works to statistically-calculated reserving levels for this buffer and by year-end the GMR had reached the lower level (the first time since 2010).

The short-medium term outlook for investments generally is much-reduced from previous years (remember when home mortgages were nearly 9% and term deposit rates not much less?)
The Trust has therefore also had to reduce its expectations of future income but has committed to granting at least \$2m a year.

At year-end actual net Capital was \$160.1m, up from \$146.9m at 31 March 2012.

### Other highlights of the BayTrust this year include:

 A further 3-year renewal of the BayTrust/Sport BoP CoachForce programme from 1 July 2013; providing \$1.268m towards gaining, training and retaining sports coaches in the Bay.

- Also a further 3-year renewal of the Rotoruabased BayTrust Rescue Helicopter operated by the Philips Search & Rescue Trust, \$600,000.
- Funding of the Neighbourhoods of Healthy
  Homes project in Kawerau along with the Eastern
  Bay Energy Trust and the KDC. This is a highengagement, community-led project focused
  on community enhancement and development
  through the vehicle of housing improvement.
  BayTrust has funded \$400,000 into this through
  its innovative Henry Duncan Fund.
- Continued support for Opotiki District Council's Harbour Development strategy as an impetus for major social and economic development in the Eastern BoP.
- In July 2012 the Trust entered a three-year Fiduciary Management Agreement with Seattle-based Russell Investment Group. This formalised a developing relationship with the firm, which has been the Trust's investment advisor since 1997 and allows the Trust to benefit from more efficient investment implementation and adjustments to global market conditions. At the same time, the Trust entered into a monitoring arrangement with Auckland-based Actuaries Melville Jessup Weaver to provide formal, independent monitoring of the Russell performance.
- The Trust invited Steve Bowman (Conscious-Governance.com) to run one-day Master
   Classes in Strategic Leadership & Innovation
   for Community groups in Rotorua and Tauranga
   and very heavily subsidised the fees so that
   price would not be a barrier to attendances.
   In total 126 people from 64 organisations
   attended the sessions and feedback has

indicated they were very well received with some groups implementing exciting changes in their governance practices.

Steve Bowman also facilitated the Trust's Strategic Planning workshop in February this year. Trustees have now adopted a vibrant new Plan for the next three years concentrating on closer community connections, a broader range of community support mechanisms and a tighter focus on where and how Trust support should be directed.

During the year under review Trustees Mary Dillon (Tauranga) and Peter Blanks (Taupo) retired and Michael Christensen (Tauranga) and Nigel McAdie (Taupo) were appointed to the Board. Both Mary and Peter had served 4 years and Mary had been Chair from September 2010.

Gregg Brown from Rotorua was elected Chair in September 2012 with Tracy Rea (Tauranga) as his Deputy.

We offer our sincere congratulations to all Bay of Plenty community groups and their supporters for their efforts and achievements over the past 12 months and we thank all Trustees and staff for their on-going enthusiasm, energy and commitment to the community through the work of BayTrust.

### NOTES TO THE SUMMARY FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### Reporting entity

Bay of Plenty Community Trust Incorporated (*BayTrust*) is domiciled and incorporated in New Zealand in accordance with the provisions of the Community Trusts Act 1999.

For financial reporting purposes BayTrust is designated a Public Benefit Entity. Its primary purpose is to distribute income from its investments activities to the Bay of Plenty communities.

### **Basis of Preparation**

#### - Statement of compliance

The summary financial statements have been prepared in accordance with FRS 43 - Summary Financial Statements and have been extracted from the full financial statements. The full financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Act 1993 and New Zealand Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (NZ GAAP) as appropriate for Public Benefit Entities and comply with New Zealand International Financial Reporting Standards (NZ IFRS) and its interpretations.

The summary is extracted from the full financial statements authorised for issue by the Trustees on 27 June 2013. Once issued the Trustees do not have the

power to amend these statements. The full financial statements have been audited and an unmodified opinion has been given. This summary has also been examined by KPMG and a copy of their summary unmodified audit opinion is included in this report.

The summary financial statements cannot be expected to provide as complete an understanding as is provided by the full financial statements.

#### - Basis of measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on the basis of historical cost except for assets and liabilities as outlined in the notes to the full financial statements.
